Ground to Air, Animals are Everywhere

From white-tailed deer to beautiful birds, River Bend Nature Center is home to a wide variety of animals. During the spring and summer months you will notice a wide variety of colorful birds flying about. Some are large birds such as Sandhill cranes and Canada geese, while others are smaller such as bluebirds and finches. If you listen closely, you will also hear the sounds of woodpeckers and maybe even the call of the barred owl. If you have ever visited the "Windows on the Wild" in the Interpretive Center, then you know of all the bird feeders that are present. When full, these feeders attract many colorful birds for visitors to enjoy. A way you can help is by donating a bag of bird seed to help keep the feeders full. This supplements monthly seed donations from Paddington's. You can also volunteer to help keep the bird feeders full.

The spring and summer months are also a great time to see those critters that are at ground level and may be basking in the sun. Yes, I am talking about snakes. Snakes may seem scary to some, but they are an important part of a healthy ecosystem and are simply misunderstood. Don't be surprised to see the common garter snake zooming across the trails or hear them rustle amongst the leaf litter. You might see a little brown fellow slithering through the leaf litter; he's a friend and goes by Dekay's brown snake. If you are lucky, you may spot a redbelly snake making its way through the woodland understory, with its bright red belly as a distinguishing feature. One of the larger snakes you may discover is the western fox snake. They will make their tail vibrate, which makes a rattling noise, mimicking a rattlesnake. Western fox snakes are not venomous and simply use the mimicry as a defense mechanism. *Please respect all nature while visiting River Bend Nature Center, stay on the designated trails, do not harm any plants or animals, and enjoy the sounds of nature.*

Naturalist Notebook

Sandhill Crane (*Grus canadensis*)

Sandhill cranes are among the largest birds in North America. You can recognize them from a distance as they are about five feet tall and stand erect. Their feathers are mostly gray with some brown; their face is white with a red crown. Flying gracefully through the air, their wing span is seven feet long. And just as unforgettable is their echoing song of kar-r-r-r-o-o-o. Sandhill cranes are migratory birds that fly south for the winter making parts of Texas, California, Arizona, New Mexico and Mexico their home. Flying north in the spring, over a quarter million birds make their stop on the Platte River in Nebraska, making this a must see wildlife spectacle. They continue to fly north until they reach their breeding grounds in parts of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Oregon, Idaho, Alaska, and Canada. Populations from Florida, Mississippi and Cuba do not migrate.

Courtship consists of a male and female performing a "dance" together with each spreading its wings and leaping into the air while singing. Sandhill cranes build their nests on or near shallow water using the vegetation nearby. Eggs are usually laid in pairs, but will sometimes be one or even three. Baby Sandhill cranes are pale olive to buff with brown or gray markings. They are quick to leave the nest, usually a day after hatching, but will stay with their parents for the first ten months of life, migrating with them. Marshes are the most common habitat you'll find Sandhill cranes, but they will also live in prairies, fields and river valleys surrounded by forests. Being omnivores, they will eat insects, aquatic plants including berries and seeds, rodents, snails, frogs, lizards, and snakes depending on where they live and what time of year it is.

Sandhill cranes have very few predators that will take them on, however; a Great horned owl may try to catch a baby bird. With having very few predators, populations are doing well, but they are at risk for losing their habitats due to land development. The concern lies along their migratory routes and the stops they make along the way. Land is becoming more fragmented every year, making it harder for these majestic birds to fly the distance they need between their nesting and summer grounds.

A pair of Sandhill cranes was spotted at River Bend Nature Center at the end of May and early June. They were heard singing, viewed flying and walking on the hillside of the prairie.
