



Deer Management: Archery ONLY Deer Hunt October 16-October 17

River Bend will be hosting another special deer hunt this fall. The hunt will be Saturday, October 16 starting at 3:00am-Sunday, October 17 at 10:00pm. All of River Bend will be CLOSED for use by the general public during the hunt. This includes all trails, parking lots, buildings, and any land within the boundaries of River Bend Nature Center.

River Bend hosts these special deer hunts to manage the health of the deer herd in River Bend. Without these hunts the deer herd would become too large, which in turn, results in deer over browsing (eating) plants at River Bend and can destroy the native vegetation. Large numbers of deer in one location also increases the risk of disease transmission, including Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), amongst the herd.

CWD is 100% fatal in deer and can spread quickly when too many deer congregate in one area. This is why it is important to not feed the deer either. Rice County is under a feeding banned, therefore it is ILLEGAL to leave food out for deer. Please DO NOT FEED THE DEER AT RIVER BEND NATURE CENTER!!

Cross-Country Ski Trails

Volunteers and staff will be working to cut back brush along the trails and preparing them for when the snow starts to fall. Naturalist Notebook

Ring Necked Pheasant (Phasianus colchicus)

Ring-necked Pheasants are a ground dwelling bird originally native to Asia, but were brought to the United States as a game bird in the 1800s. It's no wonder why these birds were brought to America in the first place; the male's plumage consists of maroon, navy, indigo, teal, copper, gold, silver, black, and a white ring around the neck. Males are also identifiable by their long gold and black striped tail feathers. Meanwhile, the female is rather drab, utilizing a more thoughtful approach to survival by means of camouflage: various shades of brown, gray, and black help to hide in plain sight from predators. Regardless of what they look like, both the male and female Ring-necked Pheasant are similar in size (think "lean chicken" sized, about two to three pounds), with the males being slightly larger than females. Ring-necked Pheasants are found abundantly in the southern half of Minnesota, and can often be found in agricultural areas, such as farm fields, foraging for crops, seeds, and insects. Pheasants opt to spend their winters here rather than migrating, which is wonderful for birders and hunters since they are much easier to spot when the crops have been cut.

Ring-necked Pheasants mate in April & May; male pheasants will typically mate with multiple females, with each hen laying about 12 eggs that will hatch in about 3-4 weeks. Newborn pheasants are small and covered in downy feathers, resembling a baby chicken with dark spots and stripes similar to their mother. Luckily for the hen, the chicks are able to walk and feed themselves once they have hatched, but will stay with her for protection until they are old enough to completely fend for themselves, about three to four months.

Ring-necked Pheasants are prey for fox, coyote, owls, and hawks, but their eggs can also be a quick and easy meal for egg eating mammals such as raccoons and skunks. Adult pheasants are able to fly, but only for short distances. Because of this, they are typically observed running from threats.

To find a Ring-necked Pheasant, visit local corn and soy fields after the fall harvest when the birds are easiest to spot. Be sure to look close along roads in ditches as pheasants will also pick at gravel to help them digest their food. Additionally, be sure to listen for their distinct crowing noise, which can be heard over a mile away.
