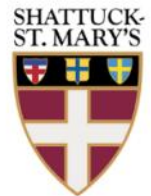

# AS SOME OPPORTUNITIES GROW, OTHERS ARE CLOSING

## »»» EXPANDING GREEN SPACE WITH FEWER PEOPLE

Last summer, I started my article with “Summer is off to a wild start for River Bend.” Even though a year has passed, the wild ride continues. This year we are juggling new challenges while growing our community reach. On one hand, we have acquired new acreage and are expanding educational programming into new communities and school districts, while on the other, we’re trying to mitigate the loss of significant federal grants and resources.

In the following pages, you’ll read about how River Bend’s incredible staff and volunteers are rising to these opportunities and challenges. Over the last several months we’ve leveraged over \$1 million in support to acquire an additional 45 acres of green space for the nature center and have prepared more than a dozen young people to pursue gainful careers in conservation. These investments from philanthropic grants and the State of Minnesota are helping River Bend Nature Center emerge as a conservation leader in the region. We are assuring that our community has additional green space for our growing population and that Minnesota has skilled individuals to care for those resources now and into the future.

While we are moving in a positive direction in some areas, we are having to adapt to losing important resources and partnerships in the near future. For the last 3 years, River Bend has benefited from more than 10,000 hours of volunteer service from AmeriCorps members across multiple programs. These aspiring conservation and environmental educational professionals have played a critical role in resource management and delivering quality programs to the community. With shifts in federal priorities and funding, these resources are largely coming to a close in the months ahead. We are so grateful for the service of these AmeriCorps members over the years. As we move forward, we hope to gain volunteers from our local communities to help fill the large gap being left by the shuttering of so many important AmeriCorps programs. Thank you for considering lending a few extra hours of your time to River Bend in the months ahead.

Lastly I wanted to remind you that while summer is a very busy time for River Bend staff, it’s also our favorite time to reconnect in person with neighbors and members like you. This summer River Bend is hosting our annual meeting and pancake dinner on July 24th at the Nature Center and our yearly Ramble Fundraising Dinner on August 9th at Shattuck St. Mary’s. Both of these evenings are fun ways to connect with your fellow River Bend supporters and RBNC staff to learn more and share our successes of the last year while simultaneously coming together to meet the challenges ahead.

# LIGHTING UP THE SUMMER SKY

## NOT WITH ARTIFICIAL LIGHTS, BUT NATURE'S LIGHTS

### »»» AS SUMMER ARRIVES WITH WARMTH, MAGIC SHINES IN THE NIGHT

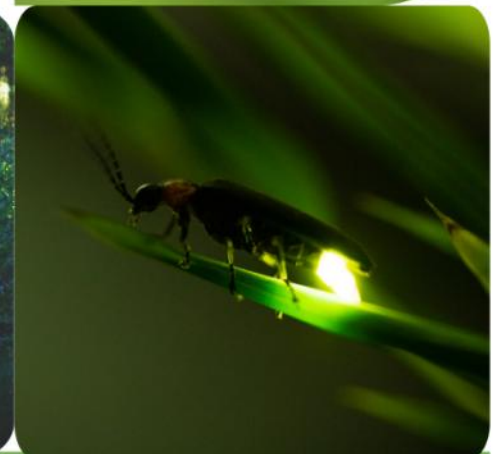
The warmth of summer in this part of the world provides us with many short-lived natural wonders. Among these, few things can compare to the illumination of the night sky by one of nature's smallest curiosities. Fireflies, or lightning bugs, exhibit one nature's most fascinating spectacles, the creation of light. So how and why do fireflies create this light?

Fireflies and their ability to produce light was a mystery for much of human history. Observations of this phenomenon date back centuries and were described in early natural observations. It wasn't until the late 19th century that our understanding of this process, known as bioluminescence, began to expand significantly. The discovery of the chemical compound luciferin and the enzyme luciferase, help to explain what was causing this light producing event. Fireflies flush oxygen into their abdomens, causing a reaction with these agents. Fireflies are able to control this oxygen intake which allows them to make specific light patterns. Amazingly, this light generation is also incredibly efficient, as it creates no heat.

So why do fireflies emit light signals? It is commonly understood that light signals are used as a form of communication. There are actually many different species of fireflies, so each species has unique patterns that help to distinguish them. Most often, these signals are used to attract mates. Males will attempt to catch the attention of females with their light display. If impressed, females will then respond with their own signal. Males must be careful however, as some larger female species of carnivorous fireflies will actually mimic the light flashes of other species. Instead of finding a mate, they find themselves as dinner.

Fireflies truly provide our summer sky with an amazing show. This show is best seen right around sundown and the hour or so after. Try looking for natural areas, where larvae remain undisturbed in leaf litter and plant material until they emerge as adults. You can also make your own backyard more firefly friendly by having native plant vegetation and turning off any unnecessary light pollution.

# CONSERVATION CORNER

## LAND ACTION: WHAT CHANGES ARE HAPPENING AT RIVER BEND?

### ➤➤➤ MINIMIZING INVASIVE SPECIES, PROMOTING NATIVE SPECIES

River Bend Nature Center has been fortunate that through dedicated members, supporters, and multiple grant sources, we have been able to secure funding to conduct habitat restoration activities across more than 200 acres to improve native habitat. A combination of management techniques will be implemented over the next couple of years to control invasive species, reduce the effects of Emerald Ash Borer (EAB), and promote native plant growth and biodiversity.

RBNC is currently focusing on buckthorn, honeysuckle, dames rocket, garlic mustard, and wild parsnip control. A combination of mechanical work, herbicide applications, and goats will be used as tools in different areas of the nature center.

**Yes, goats will be at River Bend** during the next two summers to help control buckthorn and honeysuckle in select areas. Please remember, these goats are contracted and paid employees conducting important conservation work; enjoy watching them do their work and respect their space.

Invasive work will be conducted throughout forest and prairie habitats followed up by native plantings of forbs (wildflowers), grasses and trees, in their respective habitats. Efforts to reduce the effects of EAB will include selectively removing dead ash trees and planting a variety of native trees in their place.

### ➤➤➤ RECYCLING & BIOCHAR

#### What are we planning to do with all the trees being removed?

A majority of the trees will be “recycled” through different means. Depending on species, some will be recycled into wood chips to be used throughout RBNC’s trail system while others will be used as firewood for our maple syrup production in the spring. RBNC is excited to begin implementing the practice of biochar production, through a newly awarded grant. RBNC will be utilizing primarily buckthorn and honeysuckle to produce biochar.
